## Self defence is no offence: from the Bradford 12 to the Rotherham 12

Tariq Mehmood of the Bradford 12 joins Abrar Javid from the Rotherham 12 and their barrister Michael Mansfield at this special panel meeting to discuss the police, racism and the state – and how we can fight back, Fri 7 July, 7pm

In 1981 12 young Asians in Bradford were accused of conspiracy to make petrol bombs in preparation for a fascist attack.

In their defence the 'Bradford 12' argued that oppressed people had the right to physically defend themselves

from racist attacks. They argued that the police could not be trusted to do so because they were institutionally racist.

After a nine-week trial, the jury acquitted the 12 and established the vital legal precedent that self-defence is no offence.

Some 34 years later another group of Asian men, the 'Rotherham 12', were charged with violent disorder following a peaceful protest against the Nazi Britain First. The jury found all those who stood trial not guilty.



## Where will Marxism take place?

Marxism 2017 takes place in the heart of London. It is easily accessible, within a few minutes walk of several tube and mainline stations. Meetings are held in Student Central, Friends Meeting House and the Institute of Education.

## Meet up points and picnics

There are meet up points for different cities and areas of the country in the breaks between meetings. Most of these provide cheap food. If you'd like to be put in touch with people from your region contact the Marxism office.

## Accommodation
